



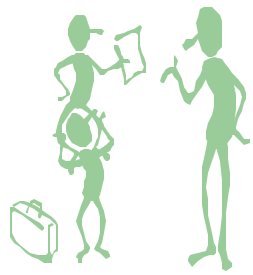

*Guaranteed Partner Initiative

Following up on a suggestion offered by NVBA Membership Secretary and Club Director Norma Pierzchala, the NVBA has been guaranteeing partners at the Thursday night Unit game and NVBA-sponsored Sectionals since the November 2003 Sectional. The GP initiative complements the traditional Partnership Chair services provided by Board member, Pete Hughes, and the relatively new, on-line Partnership Desk (see www.nvba.org), which is shared with the WBL.



GP allows players to attend the Unit Open and/or Intermediate/Novice Games, and NVBA Sectional events, and be assured that a partner will be provided if they did not have time to make arrangements with a partner in advance or their partner had to cancel at the last minute. 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Presidents' Message

It has been gratifying to me to see that despite a cold and icy winter, NVBA members are undaunted, and are coming out to play!

A new 0-199er Intermediate/Novice (I/N) Game initiative began on February 5, a night of significant icy conditions throughout the D.C. area, and drew 12 tables and a number of new ACBL memberships, complemented by an equally strong turnout in the Open Unit game, despite its being in competition with a Regional in Williamsburg. The second week, I/N Game tables surged to 16, which in addition to a GNT qualifier event in the Open Unit Game, resulted in a turnout greater almost than space available. The third week, the I/N game was well-attended with ten tables at the February 19 Sectional. Because of a schedule conflict at the Knights of Columbus, where our Thursday night Sectional games are almost always held, the Thursday night event was held at Beth El. Space restrictions at Beth El required that tables be set in the adjacent classrooms and foyer for the I/N contingent! As we move forward with the I/N game, I will work with Beth El Hebrew Congregation to obtain permanent use of appropriate and sufficient space to meet the playing needs of all of our members. In the interim, we are trying to acquire additional lighting so that overflow tables can be effectively used in the west foyer and adjacent room.

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The I/N Game features a free lesson at the start of each session. Ron Kral has spearheaded the I/N initiative and has arranged for a variety of Directors and lecturers to participate. The I/N Game has its own Director and these duties are shared by Ron, Norma Pierzchala, John Mason, Bernie Oetjen and Sam MacMillan. Whenever possible, the I/N Game plays the same hands as the Unit game. This allows for common hand records and enhances the post-game analysis by advanced players at the end of each session. February was an amazing month at the unit game. It marked the latest rebirth of our 199er game which was met with overwhelming response. As Chief Director, I would like to add my welcome to our new players. Although many were involved in getting the word out, unit president Leo Cardillo and board member Ron Kral were the prime movers. A few days before the inaugural session on Feb. 5, Leo asked me what kind of turnout I expected. "Five tables, if we're lucky," I replied. My optimism was too guarded. We had 12 tables on opening night. In addition, Leo and Ron received several calls in the days that followed from folks who said they would have played had they received word in time. They backed it up the following week when 16 tables turned out. That, added to the 22 Grand National Teams in the open game, tied the turnout record during my tenure. We want to do everything we can to see that the renewed I/N game will survive and prosper, so give us feedback on what you like and what you'd like to see changed.

One thing I'd like to make the new players aware of is the opportunity to play with a Life Master in our annual LM/non-LM game on May 6. Other special events this Spring include an NVBA Sectional tournament (April 22-25), where silver points are awarded, and our annual meeting on May 13, both of which will be held at the Knights of Columbus in Arlington. In addition to bridge, the annual meeting features elections of officers to the NVBA Board and a free dinner for all Unit members. 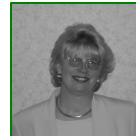

Opener's Re-bid with a Misfit

At matchpoints, with neither side vulnerable, the bidding has gone: 1♦ - P - 1♠ - P - back to you...

When opener lacks a fit for responder's suit, any strength-showing re-bid must be based on solid playing values, whether high-card or distributional. Not only does the degree of fit with responder's suit change the value of opener's hand for offensive purposes, it also affects the level to which opener can afford to drive the auction. Responder's typical, unsuitable minimum (or sub minimum) hand will consist of a long suit of his own. Indeed, that is the most likely excuse for a response without the normal high-card values. However, responder will not always be weak, and opener must also pay attention to his future problems after any of partner's normal rebids.

What call do you make with each of the following:

- 1) x, xx, AKxxxx, Axxx
- 2) x, xx, AKxxxx, AKxx
- 3) x, AQJx, AKxxxx, xx
- 4) xx, AKxx, AKJ, xxxx
- 5) x, Qxxx, AKxxx, KJx
- 6) x, KJx, AKxxx, Qxxx

1) *Two diamonds*. This is a sound, but minimum opening bid, unimproved by the spade response. Although clubs might be the best strain, you can't afford to bid 2♣. If partner must pass 2 of a minor, 2♦ will likely be much better than 2♣ when he has 2-3 (or even 1-3) in the minors. Also, a 2♣ rebid will leave you poorly placed if partner's rebid is 2NT (but if you bid 2♦ now, you can bid 3♣ later).

2) *Two clubs*. This time you can afford to bid 2♣. If partner passes in an inferior fit, your extra strength and chunky clubs will probably see you through. Most importantly, 2♣ starts an accurate description of your hand in case partner has a moderate or strong hand. You'll bid 3♦ over 2♠ or 2NT, showing 6-4 and extra values.

3) *Two diamonds*. This hand is either a minimum 2♥ reverse or a maximum 2♦ rebid. A good policy for deciding these close decisions is to go by the degree of fit with partner's suit. Using this criterion, the singleton spade suggests pulling in a notch.

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4) *Two hearts.* In contrast to (3), here you should have no qualms about reversing. In each case, you might ask yourself the question: Suppose partner, with a misfit, drives to ♠ on the basis of my reverse? How will I feel about putting down this dummy? I'd be happy with this one.

5) *One no trump.* The point of this problem is to show that, while we try very hard not to rebid 1NT with a singleton in partner's suit, sometimes there just is no sensible alternative. Re-bidding 1NT is a lesser evil than re-bidding this diamond suit.

6) *Two clubs.* Here, we have a sensible, natural alternative to rebidding 1NT with a singleton in partner's suit. If we knew that partner would pass 1NT, we would bid that, but partners have an annoying habit of re-bidding their suit when we only have one of them.

Penalty Cards

How many times have you looked down only to find something other than the card you thought you'd played? Even worse, more than one of your cards on the table? Let's talk about these "OOPS". Not all of them are fatal.

MINOR PENALTY CARD

This is any card, 29 that is inadvertently dropped onto the table. Of course, if the card is AKQJT, or there is more than one, it is a major penalty card and this rule does not apply. Stuck to another card is the usual way they get there. You may not play another low card in this suit until you play the penalty card, but if a finesse comes around that you can win with an honor you may do so. Partner is not subject to lead penalties when you have a minor penalty card. This is the only true "OOPS" card. Everything else is deliberately played, and thus becomes a...

MAJOR PENALTY CARD

If the declarer leads a spade from dummy and you are thinking about the next hand, and follow with the 2 of clubs, even though you have spades, you have put a major penalty card on the table. Yes, I know it is a minor suit...doesn't count! Yes, I know it is a small card, 29...doesn't count! You deliberately played that card and are subject to the lead penalties involved. The correction period for this card is *this trick*. If you 'fess up to having a spade before either

you or your partner play to the next trick, you have not revoked. Even if the trick is turned over, it is not too late to correct. Even if the declarer has led to the next trick, it is not too late to correct. Only if you don't catch it in time will you be subjected to the revoke laws. So, let's say you realize you have a spade. The director is called, the spade trick is corrected, and you have the 2 of clubs on the table as a penalty card. If you win the spade trick, you must lead the club right then and no more penalty card. If partner wins the spade trick, the director will give the declarer three options. The declarer may require or forbid the lead of a club. If the declarer selects one of those choices, you put the club back in your hand and your penalty has been paid. The third option is to just leave the club on the table. Your partner may lead any suit, including clubs, and you must play that pesky 2 at your first legal opportunity. If you did not correct your play before your side has played to the next trick, you have committed a...

REVOKE

Let's start with the good news. If you do not win the trick on which you revoked, or any subsequent trick...no harm, no foul, no penalty. If you revoke on trick 12, the director will just fix it, even if it

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becomes established. Any other scenario will cost one or two tricks (sometimes even more!) depending on the situation. If you did not win the revoke trick, but your side did win a later trick, one trick goes to the declarer. If you did not win the revoke trick, but won a later trick with a card you should have played (instead of revoking,) two tricks go to the declaring side. Of course, if you win the revoke trick, and a later trick, two tricks go to the declaring side. The penalty starts with the infraction. If you take the first 4 tricks in a 4-spade contract, and revoke on trick 6, those first 4 still belong to you, they happened

before the infraction. Now to the revoke costing more than two tricks. Let's say you are in a 3NT contract and the dummy has eight diamonds to the AKQ, your pard has one, the declarer has one, and you have Jxx. Declarer has high hopes of 8 diamond tricks. You follow to the A and K, and pitch a club on the Q. Look who wins the 4th diamond trick. You have just cost declarer *five* tricks. This is a very extreme example, but makes the point. The director should restore those five tricks to the declarer and restore equity in the hand.

Remember, call the director when there is an irregularity. We're there to help.

An Indian Junior's Perspective on Bridge in America

by Prahalad Rajkumar

When I started playing bridge in 1997, I was one of a handful of junior bridge players in India. Due to the common misconception that all card games are associated with gambling, bridge is discouraged by many in India. I started playing bridge when I was 14, after watching my Dad play in tournaments. I was immediately intrigued by the game, and have been hooked on it ever since. Bridge games in India are not stratified, so when I started to play, I was in over my head, and was figuratively beaten black and blue in every game I played for awhile. However, that changed over a period of time, and I started performing well. My achievements include a 3rd place finish in the finals of the pair event in the Indian National Championship, where the field is com-

parable to that in the finals of the Life Master (LM) pairs at an NABC in the United States, and a runner-up finish in the Swiss teams in the Summer Nationals, the format of which is similar to that of the Grand National Teams (GNT). I played for the Indian National Junior team in the zonal trials, and qualified for the world junior championships in Brazil. We did not fare well in that championship event, since it was difficult to form a competent junior team—there simply were not many good junior players around in India at that time.

I came to the USA a couple of years ago for my undergraduate studies, and I'm now a Computer Science major at the University of Maryland. Shortly after I arrived

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in Washington, I had the opportunity to play in the LM pairs at the Washington D.C. NABC in the summer of 2002, and it was a great experience to play against players like Larry Cohen, David Berkowitz, Andrew Robson, Zia Mahmood, and so many others. Since that time, I have been a regular at the Northern Virginia Bridge Association (NVBA) unit game on Thursday nights in Alexandria.

As a player, I am extremely aggressive, and like to bid a lot. And I like being unpredictable in my bids, much to the chagrin of my partners! I'm a big fan of the style in which Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell bid their hands, and weave magic out of thin air in their card play. In the barometer finals of the Machlin Pairs at the 2003 Alexandria Regional, I bid in my usual aggressive style and was lucky enough to finish 2nd overall. In this event, I was partnered by my Dad, and our victory was aided by this deal in the penultimate round:

Holding the South hand (top of next column), I landed in an unenviable contract of 3NT, and received the lead of the 6♦.

I chose to win the lead in dummy and played a low heart off the table (in retrospect, winning the diamond lead in my hand and playing a heart towards dummy might have been a better line of play). LHO won the trick with the ♥K,

and my prospects of making the contract looked (slightly) better.

LHO exited with a spade, which I won with the ♠Q, with RHO following with the 9, and I played yet another low heart from dummy. LHO won it with the ♥A, and played the ♠K. I ducked, RHO playing the Jack, and I pitched a club from my hand. LHO exited with a diamond. The position seemed to be leading towards an endplay, and I won the trick with the ♦K, and crossed back to the ♦Q, finding the suit to be 3-3 and hence stripping it. This was the position:

I cashed the ♠A, RHO pitching a club. Now, I was planning to find RHO with the ♣K, and cash the ♥Q and play a heart so that RHO plays a club. But, on the ♥Q, LHO pitched a spade! I exited with a spade, and LHO had to play into my ♣AQ.

There are a lot of junior players in the United States, and I think the encouragement given to the juniors here is remarkable. The master-point races for juniors and youth are very good incentives for youngsters to play bridge, not to mention the collegiate scholarships. And there are lots of newcomer games, bridge in school programs, and classes where bridge is formally taught to beginners, so there are many opportunities for young folks to learn bridge.

Stratification is another excellent concept that I have observed, since newcomers can play with other people at a level at which all are competitive and all feel comfortable, and not be clobbered by the good players all the time. It is no wonder that the United States teams are dominating all the world championships, including the junior championship. If other countries could take a leaf from the book of bridge in the U.S., there would be a lot more junior players throughout the world.
