President's Message

THE YEARS HAVE A WAY of slipping by, and as I enter my fourth year as President of the NVBA, I think of the advice that Warren Buffet offered when he was asked about his tremendously successful investment career. Warren noted that the secret to his successful investment career was a simple matter of making good decisions. When pressed further as to how one makes good decisions, Warren noted that good decisions are simply the inevitable consequence of appropriate experience. Pressed again as to how one acquires appropriate experience, Mr. Buffet wryly stated that appropriate experience is

the unavoidable result of bad decisions! So it is with all things, I suspect. These three years have provided a challenging, but greatly rewarding, opportunity for me. Working with the Board and all of the wonderful NVBA volunteers and professional staff, I have had the great satisfaction of seeing the NVBA achieve continued success in support of the bridge playing needs of our members. Good decisions, appropriate experience and some less than perfect decisions have all been the essence of this opportunity. I am fully confident that the NVBA will continue to prosper in the months ahead, and I look forward to my fourth year and the opportunity to participate in that success.

When I last prepared this column, the April Sectional and the Annual Meeting were just around the corner. The April Sectional was well-attended at 406.5 tables, continuing a healthy trend of recent years. The Annual Meeting was denied the wonderful weather of 2005, but everybody had a good meal inside the hall and attendance was a very decent 40.5 tables. The Annual Elections were uncontested. Margot Hennings was voted in again as Vice President, Dale Dallaire as Treasurer, and Kathryn Kiley as an Executive Director. Carole Grob has replaced Gene Schuyler as the other Executive Director whose position was up for election this year. Gene will continue to support the Unit as the Unit Game Business Manager and as an alternate Unit Game Director, when required.

I look forward to working with the Board in the months ahead. Dale reported that the fiscal year ending April 30, 2006 showed a small surplus in income for the year of about \$2,000, but there were outstanding expenses from the April Sectional that had not yet been paid when the books closed at the end of April. As Dale and the Board continue to work with the new accounting software, we should be in a better position to estimate and budget our income vs. expenses. With NVBA reserves holding steady at about \$45,000, the NVBA has sufficient funds to meet any contingency. All of this augurs well for the NVBA being able to meet the playing needs of the membership for years to come. Dale also reported that the Unit is holding about \$28,000 of NABC money that was not spent at the 2002 NABC in Washington, D.C. These funds, being held by the NVBA for District 6—the host of any NABC held within its geographical boundaries—will be used in support of the 2009 Summer NABC.

The week immediately following the Annual meeting, the Unit held the Life Mas-

ter/Non-Life Master (LM/NLM) game at Beth El. This is a favorite event of mine, but not one without administrative challenges. This year was marked by perhaps the largest table count in recent memory for this event, with about 24 tables, all told. I remember when I first played in the LM/NLM game, circa 2001, and Lucy McCoy was doing all the hard work of arranging the pairs. At the time, I had no idea whom my partner would be, nor, once I was assigned a partner, did I know of his substantial masterpoint holdings (in excess of 10,000). However, I do remember how much fun it was to play with this excellent partner and how he quietly and unobtrusively encouraged and supported my play throughout the evening. The fact that we had a very successful result was entirely secondary to the manner in which this excellent LM encouraged and supported my less-than-perfect NLM play. I became convinced that the LM/NLM game, despite its challenges, should become a part of the Unit's future planning and strategy to grow the membership and preserve the vitality of this great game. I see the LM/NLM game as the one night of the year when the LMs have a wonderful opportunity to mentor and encourage the NLMs in the continuing development of their bridge playing skills and enjoyment. As our collective efforts are successful in increasing the number of NLMs at the table, I ask each LM to consider how they can support these efforts. In particular, I ask each LM to come to the LM/NLM game and donate one night of the year towards ensuring the healthy growth of the playing membership. The good news is that more NLMs are coming to play (see below) - the challenge is to have enough LMs to provide them a partner. Our success in drawing the NLMs to the game has led to an insufficient number of LMs on this night in the last two years. Next year, I encourage the LMs who weren't there this year to come out and support this game - you will not regret your participation, and the Unit and the game will benefit for years to come. Mark it on your calendars and be determined to do your part. Be there!

Speaking of our NLMs, during this past year, Ron Kral, along with a host of other volunteers, notably John Mason, Gene Schuyler, Norma Pierzchala, Dale Dallaire and Bernie Oetjen, continued their excellent support for the Unit's 199er game on Thursday nights. Unlike 2001, when there was no 199er game, each Thursday night sees 10+ tables of 199ers learning to enjoy this wonderful game. More recently, with the help of NVBA Youth Advisor Jennifer Lin, the Unit has established a FREE 0-5 game for all players that have less than 5 masterpoints. These two games are critically important to the future of the Unit. The NVBA has about 1,000 NLMs and about 500 LMs we need to create and sustain an environment where the NLMs come out in numbers, or there will be no future for the Unit, or the game itself, for that matter. It's that simple. Further, perhaps the single greatest challenge facing the bridge world is its aging population. The 199er and the 0-5 games provide a comfortable entry point for the new player and for the player returning to the game. Between the programs at Thomas Jefferson High School (currently proctored by yours truly), Garfield Elementary School (Suzanne Abrams) and other similar efforts in the WBL, and the very successful Easy-Bridge! Classes run by Ron Kral, the introductory and intermediate classes taught by John Mason at a local Community College, beginners' classes taught by NVBA members Marilyn Golias at the Reston Community Center and Stu Fleischmann in the Fair-

The Jack of Hearts

HERE WAS A COUNTRY song twenty-some years ago that defined happiness as seeing Lubbock, Texas in one's rear-view mirror. In March, many felt the same way about Dallas. If you've read Nadine Wood's latest report, you know she wasn't one of them but that may be easily explained. Nadine, you see, is a fine player and may have spent all her time in the ballrooms where the national events were contested. Having spent two days there myself, I can attest to the appeal of the environment. But having spent other days in the netherworld of the regional events, I can also attest that it was abysmal beyond belief. Surprisingly, the usual suspects, lighting and

temperature, were innocent this time. The perp in this case was noise. Unbelievable noise. The air conditioner's fan generated a deafening roar, and when the system started up, it emitted a shrieking, metal-on-metal sound that was ear-splitting. All in all, it was much like playing bridge in a machine shop. For the record, the escalators leading to the ballrooms made the same sound so one had to travel a fair distance to find blessed silence. The silver lining was that it prepared you for your hotel room. The Hyatt Regency in Dallas is hard by the railroad tracks, which lent an occasional rumble, but that paled in comparison to the pops, moans, and screeches that shared your room. The rooms were nicely appointed, but anyone staying a week or more would find the drawer space woefully inadequate. And before we leave the shortcomings of the hotel, we should address the good news/bad news of the snack bar. At recent nationals, players have been accustomed to paying as much as \$2.50 for a cup of coffee which sometimes isn't that large or that good. In Dallas, you got a 12-ounce cup of good coffee for only a buck! The bad news was, if you wanted coffee, or anything else, after 8 PM, you were out of luck. In short, instead of being open when it suited us, they were open when it suited them. All in all, let's just say that a touch of Hyatt was more than enough. Still, 10,318.5 tables turned out which was far from the smallest of Spring NABCs.

Big D itself was not a bad host. The West End, featuring dozens of restaurants, was only a short walk or one stop on the light rail away. If all you did was play bridge and go to the West End for dinner, you saw hardly anything of Dallas, save for the infamous Dealey Plaza and Texas Schoolbook Depository. If you journeyed deeper into downtown Dallas, you noticed an abundance of spectacular architecture. If you traveled northeast, you found Dallas' lovely Arts district, but if you went west, e.g. to go to a Rangers game, you found an unattractive wasteland that might generously be termed "prairie" dotted with junkyards, Interstate feeder roads, and Kwik-Stop joints that offered beer, fireworks, bait, and ammunition. What more could a good old boy want? Actually, it made some sense. If you stopped at one mini-mart and bought ammo, you could rob the next one and, with a good haul, have enough money to go to a Rangers game.

Not much to report from the bridge battlefield. Jeff Roman lasted a couple of rounds in the Vanderbilt, finished 11th in the Open Swiss and hit the board in the Open Pairs.






