Equally important, I heard many folks speak in glowing terms about the excellent parking, the ease with which Maryland players could get to the site, the well-lit playing areas, etc., etc. Tournament Chairs Margot Hennings and Kathryn Kiley, and the entire staff of professional Directors and volunteers, worked very hard to bring you the best possible tournament, and your attendance and favorable comments were a sure measure of their success! In addi-

tion, for the first time in recent history, the NVBA pre-duplicated all hands for pair games in order to get the games started promptly and increase your playing enjoyment (See below for more information on the NVBA's soon-to-arrive duplicating machine!). With this truly excellent first Sectional at the Elks under our collective belts, I am confident that future Sectionals will be ever more successful and enjoyable. See you in October at the Elks!!

With the arrival of fall, there are a growing number of bridge players that are involved in promoting bridge in local schools. I am back at Thomas Jefferson High School for my seventh academic year as the Advisor to the Bridge Club (BC). Nancy Cartwright has returned as my full-time assistant. Together with Jay Lamb, the faculty Sponsor, we all anticipate another highly successful year for the Bridge Club. This year, WBL member Suzanne Abrams, who retired last year from her job in the public school system, will also continue her sensationally effective Bridge Club at Garfield Elementary School and will serve as the Virginia focal point for new initiatives at other Virginia schools. If you have any interest in supporting a bridge program at a local school, at any level, feel free to contact Suzanne (or myself) about how to get started. Together with the WBL, the NVBA fully supports all efforts to bring bridge into the curricula of available afterschool activities. I urge you to get involved – you will love every moment and it will keep you young, to boot!

The NVBA Holiday Party will be held at Beth El on December 13, 2007. The Holiday Party is always a lot of fun and has grown in attendance with each passing year. If you are interested in helping with the preparations for the Holiday Party, just let me know. The "formula" for a successful party is well-established, but there is still a great deal of enjoyment and satisfaction to be gained by the folks that actually make it happen.

The NVBA Board approved the acquisition of a duplicating machine at the August Board meeting. The technology for this equipment has improved greatly in recent years, and the cost has decreased. The NVBA machine will cost about \$3,800 and an additional \$1,000 or so will be spent to buy four complete sets of new cards, card trays and cases for the trays. The duplicating machine is capable of "dealing" a hand in about six seconds, and that includes the time to place each hand in the appropriate slot of the card tray. This machine works with any ordinary deck of cards – it does not require the

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use of bar-coded decks. In addition, the machine is rated to prepare about 100,000 hands before it might require any significant maintenance. Even with Sectionals included, it will be a number of years (ten?) before we pre-dupe 100,000 hands. The NVBA machine should be received in the late fall. In the meantime, the NVBA will make use of a machine that club owner Carole Grob has ordered for use in her club games. Carole's machine will spare Gene Schuyler the heroic work that he has been doing for the Unit by manually pre-duping hands on what is euphemistically known as the "Schuyler 5000" duplicating machine! Thanks to Gene for all his time and hard work that bridged the gap until the technology arrived!

The NVBA is fortunate to have the support of excellent professional staff in the form of Directors at every level of play and a few bridge players who receive a modest stipend (generally in terms of free plays) for tasks requiring continued extra effort. In addition, much of the work and fun of the NVBA is fully supported by a large number of non-monetarily compensated volunteers, from the Board to Tournament Chairs to Unit Game Hospitality and many more. A complete list of the current volunteers can be found at http://www.nvba.org/shtml/board.shtml. Each year, it is the responsibility of the President to propose a slate of volunteers to fill these many positions, and generally speaking I have no trouble filling them. That said, there are two areas where I need some help.

In the near term, the NVBA needs a volunteer to accept the position of Partnership Chair (PC) of the Unit Game, a position that I have greatly enjoyed for many years. I will work with the volunteer to cover all the tricks of the trade. It's the best job in the NVBA, but I have to look ahead and build for the future. As in other areas of responsibility, it has been my policy to divide a job into several logical parts, if practicable, to increase the depth of the volunteer bench and to reduce the burden on any one person. Mary Ann Kral has agreed to work on the Sectional PC responsibilities, and now I really need a volunteer to do the same for the Unit Game PC responsibilities. Let me know of your interest. I guarantee that you will enjoy this job – I really do!

The second area is more strategic, and that is to look ahead to the Annual Elections and the volunteers that might serve or continue to serve on the Board. Because this Newsletter is only a quarterly publication, the time is always "now" to encourage your consideration of Board service. I have served on several Boards, besides the NVBA Board, and have a good understanding of the need to bring fresh faces to any Board at some interval of time. I am pleased that the last election brought three new members to the Board. I'd like to see that trend continue, with at least one more candidate than the minimum we need to fill the Board slate each year. If that is the case, then the voters will have a real choice and new folks will have a chance to serve on and refresh the Board.

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The Jack of Hearts

BEFORE WE TELL YOU about Nashville, we have to get past the language barrier. The two basic guidelines to speaking Tennesseean are 1) stretch all words until they occupy the maximum number of syllables imaginable and 2) if a word won't stretch, change the vowel sound. Ergo, in Nashville, a lot of contracts were played in Fo-wer Spides. And if you play real well, you might win the Open Pay-ers. You get the gist. Then there are colloquialisms. I heard an opponent tell his partner she should have un-bared her king. It's not bad once you get the hang of it. All told, Nashville was rot nahss. They call it Music City and for good reason. Remember what I told you last time about all the music disappearing from Saint

Louis? Well, some of it might have gone to Nashville 'cause they's plenty of it there. If you walk down Broadway, the music from adjoining honky tonks blends to form a country cacophony. In fact, there's probably more music coming out of downtown Nashville at high noon on a Tuesday than in Adams-Morgan on a Saturday night. And Nashville on Saturday night? Forget about it!

The last time the ACBL visited Nashville was in 1988, when the Fall NABC was held at the Opryland Hotel. The complaint then was that it was too isolated, too far from downtown. This time we were downtown and the complaint was that it was too far from attractions. Opryland, for example. Of course, there were tours to the Opry and those who went, loved it. The Country Music Museum was close by and got rave reviews. Then there were justified complaints about the renovation going on at the hotel. And for the second straight NABC, we were in a part of town under construction/renewal. The Convention Center, which is connected to the Marriott Renaissance, got good reviews from many players, the Jack of Hearts not among them. Regional events achieved equality with national events as both were played in exhibit halls. The lighting was good, the ambience early concrete, and the design baffling. After a short indoor walk from the hotel, you arrived in a lobby two floors above the playing area. Direct routes consisted of stairs and elevators, but if you took the escalator, both legs went in the same direction and deposited you on the ground floor a healthy stroll away from the tables. The climate control also left a lot to be desired. Someday I may learn, but I didn't think to bring a jacket to Nashville in July and almost succumbed to hypothermia during the Open Swiss. That might explain my lack of success. Yeah, that's my story and I'm sticking to it.

A precious few fared better. The NABC opened with Rusty Krauss and Robbie Hopkins making to the semis in the open GNT with Jay Kelkar, Deb Dhar, Ron Kral, and Jose Cortina going out a round earlier in Flight B. Suffice it to say we peaked early as we garnered only a few scattered national overalls thereafter. They included Chuck Pecarro and Mickey Hughes (0-5000 LM Pairs), Jeff Roman and Ai-Tai Lo (Fast Pairs & Open Swiss), and Alan Schwartz (Open Swiss). Regional wins went to Stan Schenker and David Milton, Sumner Steinfeldt, Herb Fallin, and native Tennesseean, Wanda Worsham. Day-amn! Not much of a haul, was it? Given the number of NVBAers there, I hoped I'd have more successes to report but they also serve who contribute to the success of others.

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And lots of others there were. No one was sure what to expect from Nashville attendance-wise. It's not the draw of a Chicago, New York, or Las Vegas but it's still a Summer national and the players still came. The final table count of 12,879 exceeded expectations and that news was probably better received in Memphis than in Gatlinburg. You see, that made Gatlinburg only the second largest tournament in Tennessee this year. What's the world coming to?

IN MEMORIAM

Nagy A. Wehbe October 27, 1943 – August 15, 2007


As President and Partnership Chair for the Unit I have had the pleasure of getting to know many players in the Unit, especially the new players or those who might need a partner. About two years ago, I had the pleasure of meeting Nagy Wehbe, a new member of the NVBA and a very seasoned player from Lebanon. Maybe the fact that I spent much of my professional career in the Middle East helped spark my immediate friend-ship with Nagy. Or maybe it was the fact that the talented player from another country was such a quiet, unassuming, friendly and constant supporter of the NVBA that I always enjoyed seeing his quiet smile across the room. Nagy seemed to be at every game that I might play, and he either had a partner, or was perfectly willing to play with any partner that I might find him. I don't have to tell you that some bridge partners are not a lot of fun to partner, but Nagy would always flash that little grin when I asked him to partner any person, and would simply say to me, "Sure. Sure, I can do that." And he always did it very well, to boot.

A few of us had the honor of attending his funeral—Nagy was 63 when he died. After the funeral service, I spent some time with his family and friends at Nagy's home and I came to admire all that he had accomplished in his short two years in America. Nagy had entered this country by "winning" a green card lottery where the odds were about 100 to 1. In short order he acquired his citizenship, his driver's license and his muchprized, never had a chance-to-really-use, Virginia real estate license. The week after his funeral his family moved into the new home that he bought. His

oldest son told me of Nagy's life-long passion for the game of bridge, his contribution to the national team, and the perpetual cigar that he always enjoyed. I told his family that there are many good bridge players, but only a relatively few that are as passionate yet well-behaved as Nagy. Nagy was a role model in many ways. We will all miss him. I'm hoping that he will keep a seat open for me in the Big Game, and I can almost hear him saying, "Sure. Sure, I can do that."

With deepest sympathy to Nagy's family and friends for their loss, which is a loss for us in the bridge community as well.

Better Basic Bridge: Opening Leads In Partner's Suit

This column is based on the concept of Pareto's principle also known as the 80/20 rule. In essence, the 80/20 rule states that 80 percent of the time, a problem can be solved using one (usually simple) specific solution. The other 20 percent of the time the problem requires any one of many other more complex solutions. If you see the same problem again and again, and start by ALWAYS applying the one simple solution, you'll get the answer right most of the time. As time goes on and you become more familiar with the problem, you'll gradually learn the other possibilities and your solution/success rate will improve. BUT IN THE MEANTIME, you've been successful in correctly solving the problem 80 percent or more of the time by simply applying the "stock" answer every time. This concept applies to bridge. By reading this series of articles and applying the suggested solutions EVERY TIME, your game will improve. Of course, 20 percent of the time the stock answer will be incorrect. At the table, when you realize that the 80 percent solution didn't work this time, look at the hand carefully and try to identify what WOULD have worked and why, AND how you could/should have recognized that the "standard 80 percent solution" was not appropriate. This is how you improve your game with more table time.

This month we're going to talk about leading your partner's suit. There are actually several rules for leading your partner's suit <u>at trick one</u>. You must memorize and practice these until they become automatic. Note that the rules are slightly different based on whether or not you've supported your partner by bidding the suit during the auction, and whether or not you're defending against a suit contract or a notrump contract. Note that these suggestions are correct even if it's not your partner's suit you're leading.

Here is a table that describes what to do. **The BOLD UNDERSCORD** card is the one to lead **at trick one**. In the middle of the hand, the rules are normally the same, but there are some more exceptions. For example, it's often right (and OK) to lead away from an Ace at a suit contract IN THE MIDDLE OF THE HAND. As stated above, the **BOLD UNDERSCORED** card is the right one **MOST** of the time. There **ARE** exceptions. When the card is <u>UNDERSCORED</u> but not **BOLD**, this is the recommended card to lead, BUT this is <u>not</u> a desirable lead. Remember, this is TRICK ONE, the opening lead. Middle of the hand leads may be different.

1) K96 $\underline{3}$ – An easy one. When you hold four of your partner's suit with an honor (10 or better), lead 4th best. Do not fall into the commonly held misconception of leading "top". If you lead top, partner will think you have a doubleton (see #4) or a sequence (see #7), AND you'll often make declarer's job easier.

2) $Q6\underline{3}$ – Another easy one. When you hold three of your partner's suit with an honor, lead 3rd best. Save your honor to trap something in declarer's hand. If declarer holds something like KJx, leading the Queen from this holding gives him a second trick in the suit he can never get for himself. Leading low saves your Queen to capture the Jack.

3) <u>A</u> $6/\underline{K}6/\underline{Q}6/\underline{I}6$ – With a doubleton honor in partner's suit, you must lead the highest one. Normally you have not supported partner with this holding. Leading high unblocks the suit AND tells partner you only have two cards in the suit. This is why you cannot lead high in cases 1 and 2 above – partner will THINK you have a doubleton. Unfortunately, partner may think you're leading the top of a sequence. Hopefully the situation will become clear based on dummy and partner's holding.

4) <u>A</u>42 – Leading Ace from Axx is <u>not</u> a good lead. When holding the Acethird in partner's suit, most of the time it's right to lead <u>another</u> suit. If you **must** lead this suit, you **must** lead the Ace at a suit contract. At no trump, it's 50/50 whether it's right to lead the Ace or small. A lot depends on the auction, whether partner is an opening bidder or overcaller, the level of the contract, etc. You're probably going to get the best result most of the time by leading the Ace. Note the card is <u>underscored</u>, but not **BOLD** to indicate it's a lead you're not anxious to make. Also note that initially your partner will be confused since he will THINK you're leading from a combination like #3 or #7. All in all, it's better to avoid this lead if playing a suit contract.

5) $\underline{72}$ – With **any** doubleton in partner's suit, lead high. Partner will treat this as a count signal (high-low from two cards) and play accordingly. It's unlikely you've supported partner during the auction with two small, but there are some situations where you've done so (partner has rebid their suit showing six, taking a false preference after a forcing NT, et.al.). Regardless, lead high.

6) Up to this point, the lead's been the same whether or not you've supported partner. However, with three or four small, the situation is different. If you HAVE supported partner, you lead HIGH. Partner already knows you have 3 or 4 cards in the suit (you supported him during the auction), so he doesn't need the count. He needs to know which cards you're holding. By leading HIGH after supporting partner, partner can tell the distribution of all the higher cards around the table. BUT, if you **haven't** supported partner during the auction, he doesn't know how many cards you hold, so you must lead low. IF you lead HIGH, partner will play you for a doubleton (see #5 above) and likely misdefend.

7) $\underline{K}Q4/\underline{Q}J4/J104$ – From a sequence, lead top. Partner will place you with EITHER the card immediately below the card led (and perhaps more), OR a doubleton. Usually partner can tell from dummy and other clues which one it is.

8) \underline{A} K3 – From AceKing and little ones, the modern style is to lead the Ace (top of a sequence). The old style is to lead King from either AK **or** from KQ. When using the older style, it's often difficult for partner to know which holding you started with. Ace from AK is a GOOD lead.

9) AK – When holding the doubleton AK, lead the King first, then the Ace if your agreement is to lead Ace from AK. Leading them in reverse order tells your partner you have a doubleton.

Even if you follow these rules exactly, there are times when partner will find a particular card ambiguous. When partner misdefends, you can blame me and still win the postmortem because "Ron told me to lead that card!"

Q & A with David Soukup

Ten-year old David Soukup played his first bridge game in April and has been a regular at the NVBA Unit Game ever since. He also started playing at the Wednesday club game in Ballston as part of his summer vacation activities. On August 23 he had a 62 percent game in the 199er Unit game with one of his regular partners, Jenny Shaefer, and was first in his direction and second overall. On August 30 he had a 69 percent game playing with Eric Poskanzer in the 199er game and was first overall. David's presence usually brings a number of questions from other players, so his father gave him ten questions for his first interview:

Q. Why are you so interested in bridge?

A. I am so interested in bridge because it is a game where you have a partner playing with you and because it is a social game.

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Q. What is special about the game?

A. One of the special things about bridge is that you learn a complete new language. Eight months ago, a board was a billboard, a washboard, pasteboard, or wallboard to me.

Q. How did you learn to play?

A. My father taught me the basic rules. After that, he got an online bridge course. I've also learned a few conventions from books and other players.

Q. Where are you going to school? What grade are you in?

A. I am in 6th grade at Kenmore Middle School in Arlington, VA.

Q. What was your "most embarrassing moment" at the bridge table?

A. My most embarrassing moment was when I did not tell my partner that I was using a certain convention. She misinterpreted the bid and gave the opponents incorrect information. A lot of confusion followed, but I learned my lesson.

Q. What are your favorite bridge books?

A. My favorite bridge book is Modern Bridge Conventions by William S. Root and Richard Pavlicek.

Q. What are your other favorite activities (games, sports)?

A. I am intrigued by the Japanese game of Go. I also play on a baseball team in spring and fall.

Q. How is your style of play changing? (What are you doing differently than when you started?)

A. I have definitely become less afraid to declare, more aggressive, and my convention card is much more complex.

Q. What do you think about your father's natural talent for the game?

A. Well, it's enough to get through the bridge column in the newspaper ...

Q. What do you think about bridge players?

A. The bridge players here are very nice, and they have made me feel welcome. Thanks to everybody who helped me along the way, especially my partner Jenny!




Mid-Atlantic Seeks Someone To Store And Transport Tables


