President's Corner

The unit is in excellent health, and we all owe the NVBA's immediate past president Leo Cardillo our gratitude for six years of selfless service. I was hoping I would have something profound to write in my first column, but as I write this the transition is going slowly and we have not yet had the first meeting of your new board. The first meeting agenda will include making appointments. I never fully realized how many people perform the large array of tasks necessary to keep the unit running. So, I suppose the most important observation I have is that I am deeply grateful to all of the volunteers in this

unit. That spirit is critical to keeping the NVBA going (and please don't forget the Nationals this summer).

An unopposed election does not require a platform, so before the election no one ever asked me what I thought about the issues that face the unit and bridge in general. Why did I take this job? I was already one of that army of volunteers. Being recorder was at times demanding and always challenging, since I was only involved when someone was suspected of bad behavior or unethical conduct. In fact, when I was first approached by the nominating committee, I declined, since I was already doing a difficult job that suited my talents. But the more I thought about it and discussed with Leo and NVBA Vice President Alan Breed the possibility of becoming president, the more I came to believe that I could have an impact on the future of this game.

In another life, I ran an organization. I have served on enough non-profit boards to realize that an organization like the NVBA does not need to be "run." The surest way to reduce the number of volunteers is to try to be a boss. That is definitely not on my agenda! The president of the unit should have many roles, including motivator, visionary, booster, and occasionally the volunteer of last resort. I hope to grow into the job along those lines.

From that perspective, then, here is what I want to emphasize in the next two years. First, the game of bridge needs to enhance its popularity among youth. NVBA support for current youth programs is a given; what other opportunities are there? Second, we need to take advantage of the record-breaking success of our sectional tournaments. These bring money into the NVBA's coffers, and we need a disciplined budget process to channel unit funding into youth and other priorities. Third, we need to examine organizational options including incorporation and creation of a foundation to attract tax-deductible donations for promotion of bridge. The latter are complex issues, and I will report on their progress in future columns. In summary, we need to position this unit to be a force in promotion of the game in our area for the next 50 years or so.

Seven years ago, when we last visited Houston, Enron had just fallen and this space was filled with bad puns about Lay-down slams and Skilling leads. But either downtown Houston wasn't a big draw or the economy kept folks away with the final table count at 9728.5, a mere 17 tables more than Gatlinburg.

Sadly, most of the faces from our unit that you'd expect to see at a Nationals were absent. This was reflected in the results with Gil Cohen (Silver Ribbon & IMP Pairs) our only member to scratch in a national event. What's more, Neal McKinney was our only regional winner, capturing a KO bracket. I guess you could say he was our Lone Star. I don't remember an NABC with so little success to report, but I guess everyone's saving up for our NABC this summer. There were, however, some NVBAers in Houston whose names didn't show up in the results. For a nominal fee, names will be withheld.

New Event Option: Stratification by Average

Page 12

ACBL pair and Swiss team events are usually "stratified" or "strati-flighted."

In a stratified event, each contestant plays against players of all point ranges, and masterpoints are awarded to the top finishers within each group. Players are assigned to a group, i.e. stratum based upon their current masterpoint holdings.

An event that is a combination of flighted and stratified pairs is called strati-flighted. The upper level event (A/X) has no masterpoint restriction and is played as a separate game. The second-level event is restricted to players with fewer points than the upper limit of the second-level Stratum. Depending on the number of pairs or teams entered, this second-level event can then be subdivided into multiple strata (B/C/D) with specific masterpoint breakpoints for each stratum.

Pairs traditionally are assigned to a stratum based on the player with the higher masterpoint holding in the pair, or based on the player who has the most masterpoints on the team in a team event. For example, if the upper limit for Stratum B were 2000 points, a pair with masterpoint holdings of 2500 and 200 would have to "play up" into Stratum A. Beginning in May 2009, the ACBL offered the option of "stratification by average." In this case the hypothetical pair would have an average masterpoint holding of 1350 each and be permitted to play in Stratum B.

The new option of stratification by average is only available for open stratified events. It is not authorized for any strati-flighted events. It may apply to stratified pairs or stratified teams.

Our Chief Director for NVBA Sectionals, Doug Grove, offers several observations about stratification by average:

Bracketed knockouts essentially work on the stratification-by-average principle, so the concept is not foreign to our players.

Most partnerships form between players of similar ability. When one person goes over a stratification boundary, it forces the pair upward. An advantage of stratification by average is that it allows a partnership to play down a bit longer.

On the other hand, stratification by average could make it possible for a highly skilled "Stratum A" player to win Stratum B masterpoints playing with an Intermediate/Newcomer player.

Because this option is available only in stratified events, there can never be an instance of a pair being disqualified for enrolling in the incorrect stratum. However, a pair may well find themselves in a different stratum than expected if the pair was unaware of the change in stratum definition.

The NVBA Board is considering whether to authorize stratification by average for our stratified events beginning next year and wants to solicit opinions from the membership. The 2nd annual Youth North American Bridge Championships (NABC) will be held July 30 – August 1, 2009 at the Marriott Wardman Park hotel, Woodley Park, Washington, D.C.

The first Youth NABC was held in Atlanta last summer and was a rousing success with 210 tables of youth from all across the United States over the three days of play. The tournament is open to youth under 20 years of age with fewer than 5,000 masterpoints as of July 1, 2009.

Thursday will kick off the Youth NABC with a single session pair event followed by a single session team event in the afternoon. The Baron Barclay National Youth Open Pairs will be two sessions on Friday with scholarship awards. Saturday, the National Swiss Teams will be held, also awarding scholarship prizes to the winners. Cardrook games (side games for new players) will be available every day, every session. Start times are 10:30 am and 3:00 pm.

Pre-registration can be made on the Youth NABC website <u>www.youthnabc.org</u>. The registration fee is \$45. At the playing site you can register for the entire tournament (\$45), or simply purchase an entry for one day (\$15). Single session entries will also be sold each day for \$5, but those exclude eligibility for trophies, receptions and box lunches.

The bridge play will be fun, but that's not all! There will be trophies for the winners, gifts, t-shirts, and box lunches for all-day players. There will be fabulous entertainment after the conclusion of the 3 p.m. sessions each day. On Thursday at 6 p.m., we will have a juggler in the Thurgood Marshall Ballroom followed by a special dessert reception for youth, their parents, and sponsors in the hospitality suite. On Friday night, there will be a magician. A reception to honor the winners is planned for Saturday night immediately following the second session of play.

Be sure to tell the young bridge players you know about the tournament. And when you are at the "regular" NABC (July 23 – August 2), stop by, for it is a very gratifying experience to see young people so taken with bridge. Better yet, volunteer to help out and see "up close and personal" just how great youth bridge can be! Contact Shawn Stringer at **shstringer@aol.com** to volunteer.

The Top 12 Reasons You Should Play in the Summer NABC!

Although the following is geared towards newer players, there's lots of good info here for players of all skill levels. There's something for everyone at the Summer NABC, but there's even more for newer players! Aside from the excitement of thousands of bridge players all gathered in one place, there are parties, prizes, giveaways and more! Ten reasons just won't cover everything, so read on for my top dozen reasons to play:

12. Hand records for all pair games. After every session (except team games) you can get a printout showing what cards everyone held for each deal that you played in that session. The hand records are a great learning tool for discussing with partner how you might have bid or played the cards differently.

11. Go fat free. When you're playing at the tournament, both you and your partner should have identical convention cards describing your bidding methods and signaling agreements. For those who play only a few conventions, the ACBL has created a simplified convention card that you may prefer. The SS4 (or "Fat Free Card," as it is affectionately called) is available in the Intermediate/Newcomer (I/N) Program area.

10. Play bridge at midnight. Or 9 a.m. Or 10:30 a.m., 1:00 p.m., 3:00 p.m. or 7:30 p.m., or almost any time in between. Whatever your schedule, you can fit in a game. You can get two sessions in and still be home for dinner if you like, without even having to get up at the crack of dawn!

9. Bring the kids! (Or grandkids.) The 2009 Youth NABC will also take place at the Marriott Wardman Park hotel, on the final weekend of the tournament. Young bridge players who are under 20 years of age and have fewer than 5,000 ACBL masterpoints (or equivalent) as of July 1

are eligible. For more information, go to the ACBL website at <u>www.acbl.org</u> and click on "Youth NABC" on the Washington NABC page or go directly to <u>www.youthnabc.org</u>.

8. Look at all the colors. As you begin accumulating masterpoints, you'll need a certain number of silver, red and gold points to achieve the ranks of Sectional Master, Regional Master, NABC Master and Life Master. With a few exceptions, these colored points are awarded only at tournaments: silver points at sectionals, red points at regionals and nationals, and gold points for the top winners of certain games in regional events. At the NABC you can win red and gold points depending on where you place in regional events as well as national events with masterpoint restrictions, and platinum points for placing in "NABC Events" with no masterpoint limits. At this year's Summer NABC, in addition to regular team events where gold points are awarded to top finishers, for I/N players, gold points will be awarded to the top winners in the National 199er Pairs being held July 30 at 10:30 am and 3:00 pm.

7. Free stuff. Check in at the main tournament desk for your free registration gift (an umbrella). Then, if you qualify as an I/N (with 0-300 MPs), sign in at the I/N desk for another free gift!

6. Free food and entertainment. Famous Washington area hospitality will be prevalent throughout the tournament, from late night snacks and entertainment to Vugraph with live commentary on National events; from hospitality suite receptions to snack bar discounts. Catch The Capitol Steps, the nationally known, musical comedy troupe that does political satire, after the evening session on Saturday, July 25. (Check out their videos on YouTube!) On Wednesday night, July 29,

acclaimed magician Alain Nu will perform. (To ensure you have a seat, make an advance reservation for either or both The Capitol Steps and Alain Nu by emailing Barb Doran at **entertainment@ districtsix. org.** You can also get tickets in advance from the tournament Registration desk.) Other late night entertainment will include Hollywood Squares featuring popular bridge personalities, chamber music, piano, juggling and more.

For those who don't want to stay up that late, Washington Post columnist (and bridge player) Bob Levey and his wife Jane will give their funny and informative talk Inside Washington at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday July 26.

In addition to nightly hospitality, there will be three special receptions just for I/N players: at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday July 25, Wednesday July 29 and Friday July 31.

5. Free lessons. Lots of free lessons! Half-hour mini lessons every day at 9:45 a.m. and 6:45 p.m. in the I/N area, taught by such celebrities as Audrey Grant, Jerry Helms, Jeff Roman, Leslie Shafer, and others. On Saturday July 25, there will be a lecture by Audrey Grant at 9:00 a.m. followed by "Bridge University," a series of 45-minute classes offered by eight local teachers from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. On Sunday July 26, there will be a two-hour lesson by Bridge Bulletin columnist Jerry Helms from 10 a.m.-noon, and on Monday July 27 there will be another twohour lesson by ABTA Master Teacher Amy Nellissen, also from 10 a.m.-noon. On Friday July 31 and Saturday August 1, classes for people who have never played and those who want to advance their game will be taught by Washington Bridge League favorites Shawn Stringer and Lois Geer from 10:00 a.m.-noon. For a complete list of classes and I/N activities, click on "Just for Newcomers" on the ACBL website's Washington NABC page.

4. Bragging rights! Impress your friends with tales of your exploits at the bridge table. "Have I told you about the

slam I made when I played at the Nationals?" you'll say. And gentlemen in England now-a-bed will think themselves accursed they were not there! In the case of I/N players, you'll show them your winner's photo that was posted in the I/N room, and you'll say, "This photo I got on Crispin's Day." (With apologies to William Shakespeare...don't tell me you didn't rec-

ognize the quote from Henry V!) **3. Non-Life Master games.** Play with your peers! There'll be separate games for players with 0-5 masterpoints, and 0-20/50/100/200/300 masterpoints almost every day at 10:30, 3:00 and 7:30. You don't have to get beat up by Life Masters! (Unless you want to.) No one with more than the stated upper limit of masterpoints may play in these games, but most ACBL events have no lower limit. You can always play "up" if you want to.

2. Free plays and half price plays for I/N players! (Did I mention there's lots of free stuff ?) On Friday July 24, all players with fewer than 5 masterpoints can play for free in all sessions. On Sunday and Monday check out the free Bridge Plus and Happy Bridge games for players with 0-5 and 0-50 points, respectively. And for those players with 0-100 MPs, for every regular-priced entry you buy to an I/N event the first weekend of the tournament (July 24-26), you'll receive a half-price entry for any I/N event on the second weekend (July 31-Aug 2).

...and the number one reason to play in the 2009 Summer NABC:

1. It's in D.C.! How often can you take the Metro to Nationals? No long drive or plane fare, no hotel bill; just all the excitement and variety and perks of an NABC! It's like a Presidential inauguration with cards...but it comes to D.C. only once or twice in a decade. So plan now to play, and I'll see you there!


