Holiday Party–December 15, 2016

THE ANNUAL NVBA HOLIDAY PARTY, which includes dinner and a bridge game, will be held on Thursday, December 15, 2016, at the Beth El Congregation, 3830 Seminary Rd., Alexandria, VA. That week is a Sectional Tournament at Clubs (STaC) week, so the game will be held with STaC strats (0-500/1500/1500+), and silver masterpoints will be awarded for placing in this game.

As in the past, the holiday party is part catered and part pot-luck. The NVBA will provide main courses from The Italian Store, to include meat and vegetable lasagna, chicken cacciatore and eggplant parmigiana. Everyone is asked to contribute a food dish: appetizer, salad, vegetable casserole or dessert. We will have the usual sodas available and eggnog (spiked and

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unspiked). **REMEMBER, no pork or shellfish can be brought into the temple, PLEASE!** If you are unable to bring an item (or forget), you will be asked to donate \$5.00 towards party expenses. Dinner will begin at 5:30 pm.

In addition to the holiday festivities, the NVBA Board will present three trophies at this party. One is the Sara Goodwin trophy, which goes to the NVBA member who has participated in the most NVBA events (Unit game and Sectionals) between the dates of December 1, 2015 and November 30, 2016. The others are the Dave Murray award, which recognizes an NVBA player who demonstrates good bridge skills and great sportsmanship at the bridge table, and the Ron and Mary Ann Kral trophy, inaugurated by the NVBA Board to recognize players in the 0-199er game on Thursday nights at Beth El who everyone would like to partner, who strive to improve their bridge skills, who support the game with their volunteerism, and who exhibit proper bridge etiquette at the table, including friendliness towards their opponents and partner at the game. Trophy presentations will take place at 6:30 pm, followed by the game at 7:00 pm.

Washington has always been high on the list of desirable NABC destinations. There are lots of restaurants nearby, and lots to do when you're not playing bridge. This year we even had something we didn't have in 2009. A winning baseball team. As I predicted then, the Half Street Horrors have become the Half Street Heroes. The hospitality was great and the organizers and volunteers all did their usual great job. The Marriott and the ACBL, not so much.

The Marriott, for reasons unknown, kept the playing areas as cold as meat lockers. Had they been renting sweaters, I would have understood, but no such luck. As for ACBL, when I played IMPs the final weekend, I found playing cards that seemed to have been left over from the Reagan Administration. It occurred to me that they might have been pristine at the start, but I decided that they could not have sustained that much damage in so short a time. That's like saying Betty White was a teenager last week. And even if that were somehow true, why weren't they replaced? But that was one of ACBL's lesser sins. Attendance, as it has been for some time, was down in Washington. When searching for reasons, you might speculate that simple folk balk at shelling out \$25 a session for national events. Why not go to a regional and pay \$11 with lower hotel rates? Are Platinum points really worth all that? Then you might wonder why the League is persecuting the pros, their best customers. Not only are the fees up, but teams now must pay extra for additional players. So a six-man team which played in the Spingold a few years back for \$160 a day must now cough up \$300.

Still, with a National in our back yard, locals attended by the Metro carload and with more attendance comes more success. It started when Alex Prairie and Stephen Drodge led D6 to victory in the Flight A GNT for the second year in a row. And no sooner had they departed the Winners Circle then Rusty Krauss and David Rodney arrived having won the 10K Pairs with Jay Kelkar 2nd, Helene Bauman 4th, and Barry Spector 6th. Al Sitterson and Pete Harrington were 10th in the 0-5000 LM Pairs with Betty and Mike Ladd 7th in the 0-1500 LM Pairs. And that was just the first weekend! Things slowed dramatically thereafter but the team of Deb Dhar, Jose Cortina, Mel Yudkin, and Steve Bunning finished 9/16 in the Mini-Spingold, and Jim Wakefield and Helene Bauman were 7th in the 10K Swiss with Lucy McCoy, David Fleischer, and Angelo Zuccaro 10th. Others with national overalls include Hal Hindman, Annie Schwartz with David Fleischer, and Mark Chen all in the 10K Pairs. David Milton and Stan Schenker, Michael Klein, Jose Cortina and Ron Kral, and Gene Schuyler and Bob Boyd scored in the LM Pairs. Chuck Pecarro and Mark Tonnesen (0-5000 LM Pairs), John Gauss and Lawrence Fox (0-1500 LM Pairs), Margot Hennings and Cecily Kohler (Senior Swiss), Li Yiting (Mixed BAM), Ryan Connors (Red Ribbon), and Stephen Drodge (Open Swiss) round out the list. Sorry but we're out of space for regional winners. Now, to paraphrase Gen. Custer, on to Orlando and glory!

Then there's the hospitality people who help with the food, and the Partnership Chair who shows up for every session and coordinates matching people up and locating and scheduling the Guaranteed Partners. And of course there's the Intermediate-Newcomer lecturers and the folks who schlep the supplies, bidding boxes and boards to and from the playing site. The paid positions include the Directors and Caddies. The rest are volunteers, some of whom receive a token free play for their efforts and some who are unpaid.

The above is just for the four annual NVBA sectionals. There's also the Thursday night NVBA Unit game, the annual regional, and, of course, the recently held DC Metro area NABC. There are special annual events where volunteers give their time – the annual meeting, the holiday party and the Lifemaster/Non-Lifemaster game. There are 9 board members who meet once a month to address issues and keep the Unit running smoothly.

The bottom line is that your entry fee would rise dramatically if we paid everyone who works behind the scenes to make your bridge experience enjoyable. What is needed are MORE VOLUNTEERS! Would you be willing to sign up to do ONE task every few months? Are you willing to caddy one day of a tournament, or do you know someone who would like to – family member, or neighbor/friend? Could you handle partnerships one or two weeks a year at the Thursday night Unit game or at a tournament? We offer free plays to players who help out with partnerships. How about bringing refreshments to the Unit game once every two months, for example. If you are willing to pitch in some in any way, WE NEED YOU! Please catch one of the NVBA Board members (Ron Kral, Leo Cardillo, Donna Hickling, Ann Atcheson, Jim Gerding, Francesca Mazarella, Susan Miskura, Kevin O'Brien, David Lindley) at the Unit game or NVBA Sectional Tournament Chair Margot Hennings at a tournament and volunteer your services. Bridge in Colombia

In August of 2016, the week before Hunt Valley, I went to Cali, Colombia, to play in a bridge tournament.

The trip actually began a year before. In April, 2015, my wife Linda and I had visited Colombia, where I lived and worked in the 1960s. That was my first time back, and Linda's first time ever. To prepare for it I emailed the World Bridge Federation's representative asking for information and contacts. The Colombian Federation's President, Vera Rosembusz, put me in touch with a club in Bogotá and introduced me to Elsa de Castillo, Cali's "bridge commissar."

Elsa answered with a date for me to play at the Club de Bridge Santiago de Cali. This was where I had first played serious bridge fifty years ago. Elsa herself was my partner that day, and we had an excellent game. After it she insisted that I come back for Cali's big tournament in August, which she organizes. I couldn't manage a second trip that soon, and had to decline.

This year it was a different story. Elsa sent a renewed invitation, and when Linda saw it she said emphatically that I could not refuse. She volunteered to stay home so I could make the trip unencumbered.

The tournament's venue was Cali's Club Campestre (country club), a manicured tropical oasis in the midst of urban sprawl. The club has full-service hotel accommodations with twenty rooms, which Elsa had reserved for players from abroad and from elsewhere in Colombia.

The club's public areas are open to the outdoors. No air conditioning or insect screening is needed, and I did not see one single mosquito the entire week—only bumble bees. Colombian coffee, black, tastes as though it's sweetened with sugar. It even fools bees. I had to rescue one or two from drowning in my cup each morning.

Caleños complained all week about the heat, by which they meant it might reach ninety degrees Fahrenheit at mid-afternoon. I took great pleasure in telling them how hot it was up here right then.

The tournament began on Friday evening, followed by two more sessions Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Each session was 36 boards at matchpoint pairs.

On Thursday our TD, Fernando González, arrived from Bogotá. He is a WBF director who works tournaments throughout South America. The afternoon before, a shipment of Bridgemates had come, on loan from Medellín. Elsa asked me to help Fernando with them if he needed it.

He did. The units were Bridgemate Pro's—the old, original model, which he and I were unfamiliar with. For guidance, I tried emailing Joe Steele, the expert on whom

everyone in the States relies. But my online email accounts were unavailable, so I ended up using the Club Campestre's address. That worked. Joe responded with the advice we needed. Here's Fernando, working with the units in the Club's sporting events office. The table is set for our lunches.

There was an aftermath. Last year while in Bogotá, I had used my email accounts via the Internet. This year, when I tried that from Cali, my service providers did not like the looks of where the login came from and shut down my accounts

forthwith. Once home, I needed hours on the phone to convince them that I had not been the mother of all hackers from some god-forsaken place.

On Friday evening the tournament was officially inaugurated. Colombia's national anthem was sung. Then came some boilerplate oratory by Cali's mayor and another dignitary. At this juncture Elsa had me say a few words on behalf of attendees there from Chile, Argentina, Uruguay, Ecuador, as well as me from los EEUU. To flesh it out, I ventured a couple of lame jokes. One of them fell flat, and the other got a good laugh. Colombia had not yet heard it.

The table count was twenty, down from the expected 22 or 23, owing to lastminute cancelations. Tournaments being expensive, and given Latin America's level of bridge activity, this attendance was not disappointing. Bear in mind that outside the ACBL, masterpoints are largely unknown. Instead, win-

ners are awarded trophies.

I'm tempted to think that if WBF members such as Colombia had masterpoints, more players might be attracted to their games. To put it another way, I shudder to think what attendance in North America would be, playing for trophies instead of masterpoints.



Trophies and Relics

My partner and I started out like a house afire, with a 63.49 percent game on Friday night. Alas, we could not keep up that pace. By the time friendly hostilities concluded on Sunday, we ended up in the middle of the field.

Last year in the NVBA Bulletin I outlined Colombia's bidding styles. This year I saw some more conventions worth mentioning. Many top players (such as Elsa) have a card that we would easily recognize. Two over one; new minor forcing; support doubles; Smolen; Lebensohl; puppet; upside-down; Cappelletti or DONT; and so forth. Other top players prefer such things as a variant of Exclusion, in which a double jump asks for key cards, excepting the ace of the bid suit. For example, 1S-4H; ..., asks for RKC responses leaving out the ace of hearts. A single jump, 1S-3H; ..., is a splinter. Thus natural jump shifts, both weak and strong, are given up in exchange for this treatment.

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And then there was an example of what George S. Coffin, in a book seventy years ago, called "hoppity skippity" bidding. Having done a Jacoby transfer, if Responder continues with a second suit, he isn't just showing extra strength. He's forcing <u>slam</u>, asking Opener to choose which suit he wants to play it in. This may reflect the fact that much of what they play down there is rubber bridge for a nickel's worth of pesos a point.

There was an incident Saturday evening. My partner, Guillermo Hurtado, made three hearts doubled. "Making three?" he asked. His RHO nodded tentatively and picked up her cards. As she did, so did Guillermo and LHO, the doubler, who said, "Down one."

An uproar ensued. Fernando came, ascertained the facts, and told us to get onto the next board while he studied the deal. Shortly after, he ruled in our favor, judging that for the contract to go down would have needed a serious blunder by Guillermo, whom he knew well enough to discount that. The ruling itself aside, what stood out for me was how smoothly Fernando quelled the uproar. It was a display of

cool, professional aplomb, and an excellent lesson for club directors like me to see.

Such was the tenor of the tournament that there were no more than half a dozen director calls, including this one, in all three sessions (not counting pleas for help with the *Bridgemates*).

You might be interested to know a Spanish bridge word or two. The ace is "el as." The King, Queen and Jack are called, "la K, la Q y la J" re-

spectively (la kah, la koo, ee la hota). Face cards and the ace are called "figuras." Void and singleton are "fallo" and "semifallo" (from the verb " fallar," i.e. to fail). I meant to find out if anyone down there calls a semifallo "un tieso," i.e. a stiff, as A-strat people do up here. But I forgot.

To tell East-West to skip a table at the next round, the director says, "Favor saltar una mesa a la siguiente ronda." That verb, "saltar" (to jump) is the same as the French verb from which we get the cooking word "sauté." Or if there is no skip and someone asks, the answer might be, "No hay brinco." ("Brinco" is what a bucking bronco does.) The auction is "la subasta," and a bid is "una voz" (literally, a voice). To call for a ruff in dummy, Declarer says, "corta," i.e. cut it. Unlike the names of the four suits, which can change from one country to another, the foregoing words stay the same pretty much everywhere.

The festivities culminated Sunday night with a gala banquet and the awarding of prizes. There was live music, singing and dancing. Golden oldies were played at dessert time, which the youngsters sang along with their grandparents. Popular dance music followed. As one lively number struck up, I was hauled out onto the dance floor for a cumbia (the real, authentic thing—Colombia's famous folk dance). I

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had not attempted any such exertion in years, and ended up stiff and sore the next day.

Hours before dawn the next day, Monday, 15 August, my flight home was aloft. In all my life it has never failed. Leaving Colombia saddens me.

Here's something about bridge that may not have occurred to you. As players, we're assured of ready access to games and a warm welcome wherever we go. Moreover, bridge isn't just a passport. Connecting with other players can lead to quite unexpected surprises. As an example, two days after my arrival, Elsa invited me to go looking for the house where I had lived fifty years ago. After an hour of crazy-cruising we finally found where it had been.

As we went, recalling neighbors and people I had known, no doubt all gone by now, I mentioned one in particular: Ernesto DeLima. Elsa exploded. Not only was

Ernesto still very much alive, he was her husband's golf partner and one of their closest friends. Right then and there she cell phoned him to arrange a meeting.

Not having seen each other for so long, we had a great deal of gossip to catch up on. That reunion was the highlight of my week.

The tournament, meanwhile, although badly upstaged by this get-together, did

have a few special moments of its own. One of them came on the final day.

In an article for the NVBA Bulletin last year, I mentioned the outstanding president that the Cali bridge club had back then. She was renowned, feared, for maintaining law and order at the tables with no more than a withering look. But in that article I had her name wrong—confused with someone else's. Was that Alzheimers? I'm going to hope not, because as soon as I saw the name in print I knew I was mistaken.

Since then I've asked down there for the correct name. Record keeping at the club so long ago was haphazard; no one could come up with it. Finally, before the Sunday game, Elsa located a distinguished old lady, well over ninety, who remembered. The long-ago president I had in mind, she said, was Doña Soledad Fajardo de López. Hers was a name, she added, that absolutely should not be forgotten, and complimented me for bringing it up. I told her what I had written in praise of Soledad's commanding presence and steady hand at the helm. I hoped that I had not gone overboard, and asked my informant if she concurred.

"No, Young Man," she said. "You understated it."


