Mentoring—Prospects For Nurturing Players

NVBA is keenly aware that nurturing newer players is essential for the continued life and growth of duplicate bridge. To do so, experienced players recognize that they need to give back to the game some of what they have learned and enjoyed. With this in mind, NVBA is presently experimenting with a mentoring program in a field test environment. This preparation is for a larger program to open in the Fall.

A limited number of mentors in Flights A, B, and C are working with a few players who have approximately 50 masterpoints or less and who want to improve their skills in order to play a stronger bridge game. NVBA is learning from this experience as much as possible about what works and doesn't work. In the present test, a mentor plays with a developing player at least once a month for 6 months and is available to answer questions about hands and other bridge issues and problems.

From this experience NVBA plans to refine the mentoring program and open it to a larger audience. At that point players with more than 50 masterpoints will be eligible to participate. Look for more news in September about this exciting program.

Bridge at the Seaside

My wife Avril and I spent last weekend at a bridge tournament in Bournemouth on the southern coast of England. Americans call the last Monday in May “Memorial Day,” and the U.K. now calls it the “Spring Bank Holiday,” though when I was growing up we called it Whitsun.

Bournemouth is a traditional tourist town, where middle class people visited before they discovered hotter climates (Spain, etc.) in the 1960s. Avril and I hadn’t been there for more years than we wish to acknowledge, and it was great fun going back there.

We also had our usual share of adventures at the table. Here is a lead problem.

Playing match-points, I sat North and Avril sat South. I held ♠QJx ♥ATxx ♦AKx ♣Qxx. The bidding proceeds as follows.

West	North	East	South
2♣ ¹	Pass	3♣ ²	Pass
3♥	Pass	3♠	Double
4♥	Double	All pass	

¹ 2♣ is described as an ACOL 2 bid—an 8-playing-trick hand.

² 3♣ shows a good suit.

I was somewhat bemused by the bidding. Clearly, West has a distributional freak. But, most people play that an ACOL 2 bid shows some high card points. So, what was going on? I couldn’t stand it any more when it got to 4 hearts, and I doubled. So, what to lead?

Avril has asked for a spade, but maybe declarer is void, and will throw losers on the clubs. So, after much

thought I led the diamond ace. These were the full hands.

I was correct. Declarer was ruffing spades. However, I had found the only lead to give declarer the contract. Not my idea of an ACOL 2 bid, but I am quite tame compared to many of the bidders around here.

Not all of my exploits were quite as bad as that. Here’s a hand from the Swiss Teams.

LHO led a small trump and dummy appeared. Plan the play.

I love hands like this—many possible lines of play and it's not clear, at least to me, which one to pursue. My first thought was to win on dummy, and play a small club, trying to set the clubs up, but there don't appear to be enough entries to dummy. So, can I set the spades up? Difficult.... I am going to have to drop an honor, and locating the ten would be very helpful. Maybe, I should win in dummy and play a small spade. RHO might rise with the Ace (very unlikely, as he is a good player), or I could insert the spade 9 and hope the 10 is in the slot. This seems too precipitous at this point. Maybe I can delay making decisions and get some help from the opposition.

So, I won in my hand and played the diamond 10. LHO hitched before playing low, RHO won with the King, and returned a trump, everyone following. I won in my hand and played the diamond Queen. LHO won with the Ace and had to decide what to do. After much thought, he returned the club 9. I played the 10, drawing the Jack from LHO. Now I played a diamond, pitching the spade, and easily played on clubs for one loser, making the contract. I guess the moral here is, "if it's hard to figure out the best declarer line of play, it may be harder to figure out the best defense."

What is the meaning of the term “Snapdragon”?

The Jack of Hearts

Everything's up-to-date in Kansas City. NOT!! I suspect it wasn't true even when Oscar Hammerstein penned these words for "Oklahoma" in 1943. Downtown KC resembles postwar Europe. It has that bombed-out look, open spaces dotted with structures that appear to date back to the twenties. Why then, you ask, was a National held there? My question is why was a city built there? I guess it had something to do with livestock. It's famous for its stockyards and I seem to recall it being the northern terminus of the Chisholm Trail. Also, it sits on the Missouri River. Okay, that explains why they put it there. As to why it stopped growing after WW I, I am at a loss.

Back to, why put a National there? Well, it offers adequate playing space. The Crown Center features two major hotels joined by an enclosed walkway. Not only did the tournament not provide a post-game snack, they made sure no one

else did. How much effort would it have taken to get the Hyatt to keep their coffee shop open late as was the case in Anaheim and San Antonio? Why not KC? Which begs the question, if the Nationals are the ACBL's most important product, why is it left to amateurs to run them?

On to the field of battle, where Ed Lewis finished 10th in the Silver Ribbon Pairs, and Jeff Roman made it to the round of 16 in the Vanderbilt and finished 6th in the Open Swiss.
