## **Drury Bids** (Two-Way Reverse) – David Goldfrank<sup>1</sup> – for 5 March 2020 Q1: What do we normally need (in high card points and trumps) to open $1 \checkmark / \spadesuit$ ? Q2: In which seats should you regularly open 1 - with this (weak) hand?<sup>2</sup> ♠AQxxx ♥Kxxx ♦Qx ♣xx Q3: If you can assume partner opened a sound $1 \spadesuit$ , what do you respond with this hand? ♠KJx ♥Axx ♦ Jx ♣Qxxxx Q4: Suppose your partner opens $1 \oplus$ , and you don't know if it's weak or sound (or really strong) what should you bid with the Q3 hand? Q5: What happens if you make the *limit raise*<sup>3</sup> of $3 \spadesuit$ over her/his weak $1 \spadesuit$ ? Dummy (You): ♠KJx ♥Axx ♦ Jx ♣Qxxxx Q6: How can you show the *limit raise*, in case partner's $1 \checkmark /$ is strong (and you should be in $4 \checkmark / \spadesuit$ ), normal $(3 \checkmark / \spadesuit)$ is usually safe), or weak $(2 \checkmark / \spadesuit)$ is safer)? A6: The (two-way reverse) **Drury Bids**— over the $3^{rd}/4^{th}$ hand $1 \checkmark / \spadesuit$ opening bid: 3♣: a three-trump "limit raise" over 1♥/♠ $3 \diamondsuit$ : a four- (or five-) trump "limit raise" over $1 \heartsuit / \diamondsuit$ Q7: Opener's response to a **Drury** response? if weak opening bid: $2\Psi/\Phi$ if sound (or more) opening bid: over 1♥/♠-2♣: 2♦ over $1 \checkmark / -2 \checkmark$ : anything *natural* except $2 \checkmark / -2 \checkmark$ Q8: **Drury** bidder's responses to opener's 2♦ or *natural* second bid? If you have your expected *limit raise*: make the lowest possible \(\varphi\)/\infty bid If your hand is now stronger due to shape: continue, maybe to game or even slam

Q9: How would you respond to the post-**Drury** *invitational* P-P-1 $\spadesuit$ -P-2 $\blacklozenge$ -P-2NT? You hold:  $\spadesuit$ KJxx  $\blacktriangledown$ A  $\blacklozenge$  xxxx  $\clubsuit$ QJxx

You hold:  $\bigcirc$ KJxx  $\bigvee$ A  $\bigvee$  xxxx  $\bigcirc$ QJxx You hold:  $\bigcirc$ KJxx  $\bigvee$ Axx  $\bigvee$  xxx  $\bigcirc$ Qxx
